PRIZE AND AWARD WINNERS

TRADITIONAL AWARDS:

First Prize #51 Atif Alqas, "Life Model No. 2" "While unassuming in scale, this nude figure study drew the attention of the judges with its 19th century 'Academy' sensibility, simplified treatment of form and moody palette."

Second Prize #38 Sam Bianca, "The Bunker Shot At Macarthur Grange"

"This artwork was selected on the basis of its ambition and material sensitivity, demonstrating a range of brush techniques. The painting approach and subject matter is reminiscent of the realist works of Edward Hopper and Andrew Wyeth."

Third Prize #29 Helga Kelly, "Royal National Park" "This painting captures the colours of the Australian landscape and brings to mind the Australian Impressionists Tom Roberts, Charles Condor, and the Tonalist Max Meldrum. There is great dexterity and confidence in the application of paint."

Highly Commended #34 Brian Stratton, "Invasion of Driftwood" "This is a highly accomplished watercolour painting with a wonderful sensitivity for composition" Commended #28 Helga Kelly, "Dam"

CONTEMPORARY AWARDS:

First Prize: #20 Cheryl Tate, "Wild" "This painting immediately caught the eyes of the judges with its seductive paint surface, muted colours, and the play between abstraction and figuration. The painting has a strong atmospheric quality and evokes a sense of wistfulness."

Second Prize: #43 Glenda Carter, "After the Rains" "This painting has a freshness and spontaneity. It combines lyrical shapes and lines akin to the work of the Australian painter Ann Thompson. There is a sense of deep pictorial space, despite the flat passages of various colours. It is often difficult to work with a static, square canvas when it comes to landscape, but here the composition is well-conceived and staged."

Third Prize: #54Svetlana Panov, "Lace Lasagne""This ceramic artwork was delicately and skilfully
crafted, with a sophisticated dialogue between the
figurative and more decorative, abstract motifs."Commended: #42Dorothy-Rae Sullivan "Transcendence"Commended: #75Meri Andric, "Somewhere in Between"Commended: #80Valda Pommeray, "Heavenly"

WORKS ON PAPER AWARDS:

First Prize: #45 John Janis Supe, "With Only Rear Vison" "The judges were drawn to this work for its strong graphic quality. It successfully incorporates a range of drawing techniques and compositional devices such as the aerial view and use of positive and negative space. Conceptually, there is an intriguing sense of existential self-reflection." Second Prize: #9 Xavier Ghazi, "Gaby"

"This charcoal drawing demonstrates great technical finesse with its modelling of form. Astute attention is paid to the numerous faceted planes of the head—both major and minor—and the fall of light. It also sensitively captures the humanity of the subject."

Third Prize: #35 Brian Sttratton, "Red & Green, Snake Valley"

"This highly accomplished watercolour has a striking composition that highlights contrasting textures and colours with great effectiveness. The vibrant green cord is beautifully accented against weathered rusts and greys."

Prize: Y6 Elani Kelly, "Rainbow" "A bright and vivacious work with a schematic style that befits the age of the young artist." Prize: Y8 Sophia Vanzanella, "Space in-Between" "This painting is compelling. The architectural form, the treatment of the atmosphere and background, the general sense of disquiet, and the poetic title of the artwork allow for numerous interpretations to be made." Prize: Y11 Joel Torrisi, "The Face Of Joel" "A simple yet charming portrait with a satisfying use of tone and colour." Kylie Nguyen, "Fragmented" Prize: Y14 "An effective use of fragmentation and dislocation of form within a black and white print." Zoe Glezos-Turley, "Fat Cat" Prize: Y30 "This quirky sculpture reveals a good understanding of 3-D modelling and is well characterized." Angelina Glezos-Turley, "Stay Away" Prize: Y32 "This drawing uses art materials sensitively, and the tiger's snarl is unmistakably fierce." Brandon Commodore, "Shadow Goanna" Prize: Y38 "This painting has a lovely sense of imagination with its amorphous forms and subtle colours." Michael Commodore, "Little Elephant" Prize: Y39 "This charming drawing captured the judge's attention with its delicate colours and sensitive mark -making.' Prize: Y42 Thomas Barisici, "Flash" "A lively composition painted in ochres, blues, and greys. A poetic treatment of a lightning storm withín a landscape." Prize: Y48 Eilbron Edmon-Akhshirish, "The Journey"




